It was Lee who first suggested that I become Chairman and with her recent sad passing from this world, I am glad I have been able in some measure to continue the valuable work which she and James bequeathed.

Due to pressure of my own work, I must now pass on the torch that was passed to me. I hope that there will be others who will now take up some of the tasks and share some of the workings of the ASPRA Family, for the benefit of all in our neighbourhood, with whom I hope still to maintain links.

With thanks to my Colleagues who have served with me during this past year, to all the Road Representatives, Members & Residents who have supported me and wishing the new Committee & All at ASPRA the very best of luck for the future.

MEMBERSHIP RENEWAL NEW PROCESS

ASPRA Membership Subscriptions are now due. With this magazine you should have received an envelope for you to fill out with your contact information and subscription which should be returned to your road rep. The subscription fee has been increased to £4 for the year which was agreed at the AGM; you can pay by cash, cheque, bank transfer or standing order.

The new process is as follows:

- Road Rep writes their name and address on each envelope which is inserted into the magazine and delivered to each resident.
- Resident completes the details and includes payment
- Road Rep collects subscriptions, or resident delivers to Road Reps house.
- Road Rep collates information which is passed onto Postmaster with copy of Membership Form and the collected subs.
- All cash should be converted into one cheque.

Benefits

- Each Road Rep manages the membership and subscriptions for their road.
- A central record of all members is maintained by collating returns from Road Reps, most of which will hopefully be done electronically.

Constitution Changes

The subscriptions for 2015/16 will be collected in November 2014 and subscriptions for 2016/17 will not be collected until May 2016. This reflects constitution changes agreed at the AGM including the change of the date of the AGM from September to April which means the next AGM will be in April 2015.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH By Malcolm Saunders Hon. Secretary CBNWA

What is the purpose of Neighbourhood Watch? It helps to prevent crime by making people aware of crime prevention measures, how they can assist the Police by being aware of potential criminal activity and knowing how to report it.

So how does it work? Croydon Borough Neighbourhood Watch Association (CBNWA) covers the whole borough of Croydon. A "Watch" area can be whole or part of a road or a block of flats where one person acts as a Coordinator, who acts as a focal point and keeps their watch informed of crime prevention measures, current scams and other criminal activity notified to them by CBNWA or the Police. CBNWA produces a newsletter 3 times a year which the coordinator delivers or emails to households in their Watch and CBNWA emails a weekly update to coordinators which gives the latest information which the coordinator disseminates.

What are the benefits of being in a Neighbourhood Watch? The main benefit is to build up a community spirit, get to know your neighbours, watch out for them particularly the elderly and vulnerable, be informed of the latest scams, bogus caller activity; crime prevention measures is a bonus for those in a Watch. A Watch will also be able to have Neighbourhood Watch signs displayed on lamp posts at either end of their Watch area and NW stickers are available to those in a Watch to display, which reminds criminals they are in a neighbourhood Watch area; some insurance companies will give discounts on house insurance to those in a Watch area.

PAUL RAPHAEL MONTFORD (1868-1938) Sculptor of the Croydon War Memorial By Hilary Chelminski

In this Centenary year of the start of World War I, we remember the creator of Croydon's War Memorial, Paul Raphael Montford. He attended the Royal Academy Schools from 1887, where he was taught modelling by his father. He won the Gold Medal in 1891, the Landseer Travelling Scholarship to study in Italy, France and Spain and continued to exhibit work regularly at the Royal Academy most of his life.

He followed his father into sculpture, making bronze portrait busts, figures and carved architectural sculpture including the portraits of artists in the Victoria & Albert Museum and the Croydon War Memorial in 1921, with the evocative and poignant figures of a soldier bandaging his own arm and a woman holding a child with one hand and a letter in the other. He won the competition to make 4 magnificent sculptural groups for the Kelvin Way Bridge in Glasgow (1914-1920) and did projects in Cardiff and Battersea as well as the Memorial to the Musicians Who Died on board the Titanic.

In 1922, he moved to Melbourne, Australia, where he became the foremost sculptor of public monuments including "The Shrine of Remembrance", with 4 granite buttress groups which was included in an Exhibition in 2007. His statue of Adam Lindsay Gordon at Melbourne was awarded the Gold Medal of the Royal Society of British Sculptors. His work is all over Australia including 8 relief portraits in Parliament House, Canberra, a war memorial in the Australian Club, Sydney and a figure of John Wesley in Melbourne. He was president of the Victorian Artists Society 1930-32. and his sculptures are in the National Gallery of Victoria in Melbourne and Adelaide.

Paul Montford married the portrait painter Maria Dibdin in 1912 and they had 2 daughters and 1 son. On his death from Leukemia in 1938 in Richmond, Victoria, she returned to England, where she was granted a Civil List pension for her husband's services to sculpture. She scattered his ashes in woods in Leatherhead, Surrey. The Greeks and the great Italians had appealed most to Paul Montford and he refused to be influenced by the modernist school, convinced that it was a passing phase in art. 

DELDERFIELD PLAQUE UNVEILING By Hilary Chelminski





On 4th September, 2014 the Mayor of Croydon, Councillor Manju Shahul-Hameed unveiled a "Blue Plaque" to commemorate the writer R.F. Delderfield (1912-1972), who lived at 22 Ashburton Avenue, Addiscombe 1918-1923, in the presence of members of the Delderfield family including his daughter Veronica Persse, which was made possible by kind permission of the present owners of the house, Ellen and Fred Stothard and members of ASPRA, who funded it.

Many of his books have been adapted into successful plays and TV series. Those directly based on Addiscombe include "The Dreaming Suburb" and "The Avenue Goes to War" which were adapted for the ITV series "People Like Us" (1977/78) starring John Duttine who also appeared in "To Serve Them All My Days" (1980/81) which The New York Times said was "the best drama series ever made by the BBC, describing it as "a richly textured tapestry crammed with social details that were the speciality of Delderfield." The first "Carry On" film: "Carry On Sergeant" (1958) was also based on Delderfield's play: "The Bull Boys."

He also wrote about the area in his autobiography: "Overture for Beginners." He was spoken of warmly by all who knew him and was a great champion of the suburbs and those who live there, writing: "These people are for the most part unsung, even though they represent the greater part of Britain's population. The story of country dwellers and city sophisticates has been told often enough; it is time somebody spoke of the suburbs, for therein, I have sometimes felt, lies the history of our race".

Lee Chester tragically died after a short illness in August.

GP Surgeries Patient Participation Group (PPG)

The Stovell House Surgery has consulted a "Virtual PPG" since 2011 and now has a "Face-to-Face PPG" which met for the first time in October. The aims of the Group are:

From 1 December 2014, the Friends and Family Test (FFT) which is already in use in hospitals will be available in GP practices, from January 2015 in mental health and community services and from 1 April 2015, it will be expanded to NHS dental practices, ambulance services, patient transport services, acute hospitals outpatients and day cases.



UPDATE ON ASPRA'S ACTION OVER TRAFFIC AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IN BINGHAM ROAD By Bob Sleeman

After discussions with the Road reps for Bingham Road, a site meeting with Councillor Rendle, Mike Barton (Highways), Fred Demay and Bob Sleeman was held on Wednesday 24th September 2014 in Bingham Road. The conclusions are listed below and while positive, suggest that there will be no action on crossing points and associated road works until at least April 2016.

- The introduction of 20MPH zones in residential areas across Croydon is actively under discussion. This would include Bingham Road as well as all other roads in the ASPRA area excluding Addiscombe and Lower Addiscombe Roads.
- 2. The extension of the Controlled Parking Zone might help reduce commuter parking. Residents would be consulted as this would require parking permits.
- 3. The most favoured option is to improve sight lines for drivers and pedestrians. Road narrowing could be provided at Claremont and Parkview Roads and road narrowing increased at Sherwood Road.
- 4. Some figures on accidents of personal injury reported to the Police were provided (10 in the period of 36 months to 31st May 2014). These show accidents at all junctions apart from Sherwood and Kingscote Roads.

Data for a sample weekday in April 2014 from the speed sensor near Craven Road shows that 82% did not exceed 30mph, 17% drove between 30 and 40mph and 1% exceeded 40mph. This is a significantly better statistic than in many roads across the borough. A more detailed report will be published on the website – see ASPRA News and Announcements.

Changes to Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Process

The Children and Families Act 2014 is driving changes to the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) system. By September 2014 Croydon, along with other local authorities across the country, will have to publish a Local Offer of services for children and young people (aged o-25) with SEND.

Croydon's Local Offer provides information on a range of services for education, social care, health and leisure opportunities. It also provides information on pathways to employment, accommodation and independent living. The Local Offer has been compiled with the feedback received from parents, carers and children and young people. We will use it as a basis for further dialogue with service users to review and improve service provision.

An important change brought about by the Act is that the Statement of Special Educational needs will be replaced by an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP). This will mean that education, health and social care services will need to work together more closely to identify the services needed by children and young people with SEND. Each Education Health and Care Plan will describe the outcomes and aspirations for the child/young person and the service that they will need to help them meet these outcomes.

If you work with children and /or young people with SEND, you need to be aware of these changes and what they will mean for your service. Also if you are a parent of a child/young person with SEND you need to know about how the changes will affect you. For further information please contact:

Addiscombe Pottery An appeal for information By Bernice and Daniel Golberg

Having lived in Addiscombe since 1979, we have acquired a few pieces made by Addiscombe Pottery Ltd and we are keen to find out more about the company and the potters. We have only found a couple of references to Addiscombe Pottery and these relate to Bernard Cotes who founded the Hastings Pottery in 1956 with Dennis Lucas. Cotes had previously worked at Orchard Pottery Addiscombe. Cotes left Hastings Pottery and set up Battle Pottery in 1957, whilst Lucas continued with the Hastings Pottery until it closed in 1995.

The pottery items we have include rather charming and humorous egg cups with individually hand painted faces, a teak and metal stand for a set of two egg cups, a small tankard with a handle and a design of a prancing horse similar in style to the Lascaux cave paintings. The pots are marked 'Addiscombe Potteries Ltd' or 'Addiscombe Pottery' on the bases and look like 1950s or 1960s in style.

We would love to know where the pottery was from, when it was founded, when it closed and the range of their output. The name 'Orchard Pottery' suggests that it might have been in Cherry Orchard Road. If you can help please email us at solderg@btinternet.com








BRITISH HEART FOUNDATION LONDON TO BRIGHTON NIGHT BIKE RIDE By Vince Hemment



Our little cycling group of 5 riders decided to meet the challenge and take part in the British Heart Foundation Charity Bike Ride, which consists of cycling to Brighton (62 miles) at night, leaving from Tower Bridge. The initial idea was met with enthusiasm, but then reality sets in (as it's not just a case of jumping on your bike and riding 62 miles) especially at the age of 66!

Training

BHF provide a training schedule which you can follow, to avoid injury, build your stamina and to enable you to safely ride the distance involved. However, we decided to carry out our own training, which meant building up both distance and hill climbing; the worst hill to climb is Devil's Dyke, just outside Brighton. On various days we were cycling 30, 35, 45 & 65 miles on a regular basis. We began cycling circular routes, including Box Hill and eventually riding to Brighton during the day as part of our training routine.

Night Riding

With 3,000 cyclists on the road, how do 5 cyclists keep together when it's dark, everyone is wearing high viz clothing and there are bright cycle lights everywhere? The start of the ride was staggered, starting at 22:00 through to midnight.

Weather

It was very warm, although rain was forecast. It started to rain 17 miles from Brighton, which slows you down, as wet manhole covers can be very slippery when wet.

London to Brighton

It was slow getting out of London, with lots of people outside, as the night was very warm. The first water stop was at the top of Coulsdon, before dropping down to Hooley and the back country lanes to Brighton.

I have never experienced it before, but to see the sun rise is amazing! Night turns slowly into day in a gradual process. We were wet through and cold so it was a welcome sight to eventually see the finish of the ride just past the pier at Brighton.
