

Betty Westgate Plaque by Jenny Crook

Betty Westgate, Cancer Care Campaigner and Founder of National Charity Breast Cancer Care, has been awarded a posthumous blue plaque outside her former home in Colworth Road for services to charity. This is a permanent reminder of a remarkable woman whose legacy still continues today.

Betty Westgate lived on Colworth Road in Addiscombe until her death in 2000, spent over 30 years supporting people affected by breast cancer. In 1968 Betty had a biopsy for a lump in the breast. It was originally diagnosed as benign but a week later she was told she would need a mastectomy. When she asked the doctor about the operation, he could not understand her need to want to know. On her discharge, a timid young nurse thrust a wad of cotton wool into her hand, suggesting she put it in her bra, "as it would make her look more normal." After this experience she was convinced that women needed help, comfort, consideration, sensitivity and information so she began to research the subject in considerable depth; her career as a Biology teacher must have been an advantage in this mission. Thus was born Breast Cancer Care.

In 1973 she started the Mastectomy Association, running a telephone support line from her back room, which offered help and information to people affected by breast cancer. In 1974 Betty designed the "Cumfie" bra. She had prostheses made in different sizes and weights. She travelled the world to talk and educate people about the charity. Through Betty's determination the Mastectomy Association grew and became Breast Cancer Care in 1994.

At midday on Monday 19 October, a crowd of about 50-60 including many ASPRA residents gathered, to watch the unveiling of Betty's plaque at 1 Colworth Road. The whole event was organised by Lyn Simmons, Betty's next door neighbor and friend. Lyn welcomed everyone to the unveiling ceremony. "In my 20 years of living next to Betty, I always thought of her and her husband Jim as just lovely, friendly neighbours. As the years passed by we discovered what an incredible woman she was and the pioneering work she was doing behind closed doors. It also explained why their phone would ring at all hours!

I had presumed she was a very popular woman, but it all made sense when she told me about the support line she was single handedly running. This plaque is a great way to celebrate Betty's life and her incredible work." The Mayor of Croydon, Patricia Hay-Justice said that she had particularly wanted to come to the ceremony as she had lost her sister to breast cancer recently. She was also proud of Betty's achievements as a citizen of Croydon.





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Stag Beetles in Addiscombe By Bob Sleeman



The new subscription-based Green Waste Disposal Scheme got under way in the ASPRA area on Thursday 28 April and will continue on alternate Thursdays until November. The new wheelie bin works well as a vertical wheelbarrow moving around the garden where careful pruning is required. It was quickly filled up with winter trimmings, leaves and spring grass mowing.

On 30 April I had no excuse to avoid gardening again and so the rampant ivy and prickly berberis (an excellent crime prevention plant) soon filled the bin. Next came the grass mowing and then the tidy up along the foot of the fence.

An old and now dead berberis snapped in my hand and out came the root together with the creepy crawlies, wood lice and some fat stag beetle larvae. The stump & larvae are now back where they came from.



On "Streetlife" (www.streetlife.com), a local social network where people can talk to their neighbours online, there has been some conversation about stag beetles so search for "Stag beetles 2016" and add your discoveries. I didn't spot any in 2015 but when we first moved here in the early 80s they were very common and summer evenings were often accompanied by the sound of the whirring of their wings and the pop of these large flying beetles crashing into windows and patio doors. They are actually quite harmless.

This is outside our control. Betty and Jim brought up their four sons in Colworth Road and two of them, Graham and Michael, were present. Michael, standing beside his younger brother Graham, gave a moving speech about the remarkable qualities of his mum and how proud they were. It was obvious that Betty showed the same determination in their upbringing, striving to give them the best opportunities she could with their limited financial resources. They reminisced about their younger days at 1 Colworth Road and Betty's grandchildren remembered being taken round Bingham Park when they visited Addiscombe.

Samia al Qadhi, the CEO of Breast Cancer Care, spoke about Betty's legacy. "I had the pleasure of working with Betty during my years at Breast Cancer Care. She was such a wonderful woman who wanted the best for people with breast cancer: this has remained the core principle at Breast Cancer Care; providing care, support and information from day one. With over 55,000 people each year receiving a devastating diagnosis, Betty's vision has never been more important and we are committed to continuing her amazing work."

The final speaker who led the unveiling was renowned Breast Cancer Oncologist, Professor Trevor Powles, a patron of Breast Cancer Care. Until 2003 he was Head of Breast Cancer at the Royal Marsden and is now Medical Director at the Cancer Centre London, Emeritus Professor of Breast Oncology at the Institute of Cancer Research and a patron of Breast Cancer Care. Having known and worked with Betty, he spoke of her drive in setting up the support helpline from her home in Colworth Road. Betty went to meet him in the 1970s at the Marsden and he acknowledged her understanding of the many facets of breast cancer and her ability to understand women. He outlined the advances, developments and progress made during his career in the treatment of breast cancer as well as of those who are affected by it. He highlighted the treatment for breast cancer since Betty's diagnosis all those years ago and the essential work carried out by the charity today.

Before retirement Lyn was an events organizer. These skills were very useful for Betty's Plaque Project, not only in the planning in recent months but the attention to detail on the unveiling day. A number of gates and walls in Colworth Road were decorated with large pink bows in 'Breast Cancer Awareness Month'. The window boxes of No. 1, of other nearby houses and the area round a pavement tree outside No. 1 were all freshly planted with small pink cyclamen. As the crowd waited for the VIPs to arrive and the ceremony to begin, trays of cupcakes were passed round along with small meringue cases, each filled with whipped cream and topped with two red raspberries!



Jumble Trail By Jenny Crook



Jumble Trail was set up to raise funds for ASPRA Festive Lights and give local residents the opportunity to de-clutter, sell homemade goods and meet their neighbours.

The Jumbletrail.com website was the starting point. Fliers were distributed to every house in the ASPRA area and residents were encouraged to register a stall for a fee of £5. The site was used to communicate with stallholders with a phone contact for queries. There was a map available on the website where stallholders could show the location of their stall. A Facebook page was set up, information was posted on Streetlife and posters were displayed in local shops and on lamp posts in the ASPRA area - although Storm Katy helpfully washed out the details on some! Allen Heritage sponsored the event with their boards and a generous donation to ASPRA. Boards advertising the event were 'placed' in front of stallholders' properties with neighbours response: 'I thought you were moving house!'

We had just over 50 stalls. Unfortunately it was not possible to print off a clear map from Jumble Trail as a few stallholders did not locate their stall too precisely! A few days before the event we produced a map of all the stalls with the house numbers and streets for those following the trail and copies were also available on the stalls.

We were delighted that the great majority of stallholders decided to brave the bad weather and it was heartening to see people following the Jumble Trail throughout the day. People were friendly and even if they didn't buy anything, most were happy to chat. Some had come for a purpose: one man asked, 'Have you got any old bikes?' Maybe next time. Feedback from stallholders was very positive; it was a successful community event. Stallholders met people from within the ASPRA area, as well as visitors from Bromley, Purley and further afield. A lot of stall holders and residents said they would have a stall next time.

Roads where there were several stallholders attracted greater footfall and single stalls and those on the edge of the ASPRA area had fewer visitors. Next time it would be better for neighbours to create a group of stalls in the same road and a Saturday in the summer months was favoured. One stallholder volunteered to become a Road Rep after meeting some active members. She also commented that the ASPRA Jumble Trail can only get bigger and better! We hope so too.

Croydon Local Plan By Bob Sleeman

The CLP is a major piece of work and we really need an experienced planner to take this on as an ASPRA project.

ASPRA worked with other local Residents' Associations to produce a formal response to the Council regarding the Local Plan. The appeal for a longer consultation period was rejected, so there was no joint response but the ASPRA response was presented on time. An edited version is available at: www.theaspra.org.uk/files/16-agm15.pdf.

This was the second round of consultation and it became clear that there were several significant new items hidden in the mountain of paperwork. These included deregulation of metropolitan open land to allow high density housing and designation of areas where "intensification" would be allowed which impact on the eastern fringe of the ASPRA area. Also of concern were provisions for Traveller sites in wards adjacent to Ashburton. Unfortunately Heritage status has been rejected so we can expect unsympathetic developments.

Another area of planning related to proposals for a London-Brighton railway running through Elmers End, Addiscombe and Selsdon via Uckfield and Lewes. ASPRA added its objection and responded to the chairman of the Whitgift Estate RA as coordinator. Our MP indicated that the proposals had been shelved in favour of two extra platforms at East Croydon, requiring the demolition of buildings, removal of part of Gloucester Road and the construction of a new railway bridge linking Lower Addiscombe Road and St James's Road.

Bingham Park Gardening Group By Lyn Simmons

Within our area we are very fortunate in having a hidden gem tucked away behind Bingham Road. Addiscombe Recreation Ground, as it is formally known, dates back to 1911. It was previously farmland and at one time was part of the Ashburton Estate (*see article on Ashburton Estate - Ed*). Locally we refer to our green space as Bingham Park.

It is a very well used park, not only by young children enjoying the playground and older children playing football and tennis but also by numerous dog walkers. Runners and walkers use the perimeter path to keep fit and there are several seats to rest and enjoy the green space. Snowmen are built in winter and families enjoy picnics in the summer.

Over the years, we have seen some changes to the park, including the loss of park keepers and the grassing over of rose beds. Following an email sent to ASPRA members, a group of volunteers has now formed a gardening group with the aim of restoring two flower beds to their former glory. A meeting with a member of Croydon's Parks department resulted in the contractors responsible for park maintenance clearing the two beds of weeds and pruning the shrubs. This has given the group an almost 'blank canvas' to start planting. The group was very fortunate in acquiring several hundred crocus bulbs from the pop-up crocus farm on the former Taberner House site. So Bingham Park will have its own beautiful crocus garden. There are currently no funds available to purchase plants, although research is being conducted on what grants may be available.

In the meantime, the gardening group are searching their own gardens for cuttings and surplus plants to bring to the park and one member sourced some rocks to mark out the bed backing on to Carlyle Road. Bingham Park is a fantastic resource for so many members of our community and we want to add some colour and beauty to the flower beds. Who knows, with more volunteers we could focus on some other areas of the park, particularly the three entrance walkways.

The Sunday Times recently reported on a call for gardening to be made compulsory on the primary curriculum so perhaps families in the area with small or no gardens might want to participate in our garden projects.

Lady Ashburton subsequently had an intimate friendship with the American neo-classical sculptress, Harriet Hosmer (1830-1908). When Lady Ashburton died in 1903, the estate passed to her grandson, Lord Spencer Douglas Compton. Subsequently the land was sold and permission was given to build, stipulating that all the houses should be of "ornamental appearance" and "good and sound materials". Prices were to be not less than £350 for a detached house, £300 for a semi-detached and £275 for a terraced house. Ashburton House itself was demolished in 1912/13.

The new houses were laid out in attractive, tree-lined roads and avenues, each with a good sized front and back garden, rear access lanes etc. and this pattern largely remains. Many houses were strongly influenced by the "Arts & Crafts" movement of the day, with half timbering, decorative hung tile work, gabled roofs and stained and leaded glass.

The Black Horse pub (recently demolished) was said to be the oldest in the area. Woodside Race Course is shown on the 1868 ordnance survey map on the site of Ashburton School, now the Oasis Academy and Woodside Station was built with special facilities for the movement of the horses.

(At the invitation of Croydon Council's Spatial Planning Department, in 2014 ASPRA applied for Local Heritage Area designation. Aside from some individual buildings as candidates for listings, this was turned down in 2016. Although acknowledged as an attractive place to live with buildings of some merit, the ASPRA area did not meet with the required English Heritage criteria for LHA purposes.)

Addiscombe and the Ashburton Estate By Hilary Chelminski



"Adscomb", as Addiscombe was originally spelled, within the Croydon Manor, was enclosed land belonging to Eadda from Anglo Saxon times. It was primarily given over to farming (crops included wheat, oats, barley, beans, peas, cabbage and hay) and as it had a number of clay beds, there was also a brick making industry, based mainly

around Woodside. Addiscombe roughly comprises three areas which were three historic estates, each with its own mansion house: Addiscombe Place designed by Sir John Vanbrugh, which later became the East India Military Academy; Ashburton House, on the corner of Northampton Road and Addiscombe Road; and Stroud Green House, closer to Shirley and Ashburton Park, all now demolished. The area covered by ASPRA, bounded by what is now Northampton Road, Shirley Road (then Stroud Green Lane), Addiscombe Road (then Addiscombe Lane) and Lower Addiscombe Road (then Beckenham Road), closely coincides with the original Ashburton Estate.

The Ashburton family fortunes were founded by Johann (later John) Baring (1697-1748), a German immigrant from Bremen, apprenticed to a wool merchant in Exeter, who married Elizabeth Vowler (1702-1766), the daughter of a wealthy grocer with a dowry of £20,000. They prospered and their children went into the world of merchant banking. Their son, Sir Francis Baring (1740-1810) married Harriet Herring (1750-1804), daughter of Croydon merchant William Herring and cousin of Thomas Herring, Archbishop of Canterbury. They also prospered and Sir Francis became a director of the East India Company from 1779. Through their trade with North America, their son Alexander married the eldest daughter of the wealthy Senator William Bingham and their third son married his younger daughter. Alexander became 1st Baron Ashburton. His eldest son, William Bingham Baring (1799-1864), married Lady Harriet Mary Montagu (1805-1857), who inspired the devotion of Thomas Carlyle. Their only child died in infancy and on the death of his wife Lord Ashburton married Louisa Caroline Stewart-Mackenzie (1827-1903). They had one daughter, the Hon. Mary Florence, who married William Compton, 5th Marguis of Northampton. Lord Ashburton died in 1864 and was succeeded in the barony by his younger brother, Francis.
